while written sources on the history of greece have been studied extensively no systematic attempt has been made to examine photography as an important cultural and material process this is surprising given that modern greece and photography are almost peers both are cultural products of the 1830s and both actively converse with modernity camera graeca photographs narratives materialities fills this lacuna it is the first inter disciplinary volume to examine critically and in a theorised manner the entanglement of greece with photography the book argues that photographs and the photographic process as a whole have been instrumental in the reproduction of national imagination in the consolidation of the nation building process and in the generation and dissemination of state propaganda at the same time it is argued that the photographic field constitutes a site of memory and counter memory where various social actors intervene actively and stake their discursive material and practical claims as such the volume will be of relevance to scholars and photographers worldwide the book is divided into four tightly integrated parts the first imag in ing greece shows that the consolidation of greek national identity constituted a material cum representational process the projection of an imagery although some photographic production sits uneasily within the national canon and may even undermine it the second part photographic narratives alternative histories demonstrates the narrative function of photographs in diary keeping and in photobooks it also examines the constitution of spectatorship through the combination of text and image and the role of photography as a process of materializing counter hegemonic discourses and practices the third part photographic matter realities foregrounds the role of photography in materializing state propaganda national memory and war the final part photographic

this book offers a series of contents that revolve around the different theoretical aspects of aesthetics and narratives in audiovisual media under this aspect this publication works under a double aspect on the one hand it is a research and dissemination work since it presents the concepts in an accessible way allowing any reader interested in the audiovisual world to delve into the principles that govern the creation and analysis of the different audiovisual contents but on the other hand the book can serve as teaching material for audiovisual communication studies script sound postproduction etc as it delves into key issues for the training of future professionals in the audiovisual sector all this accompanied by a multitude of graphic examples based on these particularities this book introduces contents ranging from the creation of a film script delving into the structure and essential elements of audiovisual narrative to the analysis of the sound aspects that enrich the audience s experience the book also explores audiovisual editing and postproduction techniques which are essential to give aesthetic and narrative coherence to the works and a section is dedicated to storytelling in interactive digital media highlighting the importance of the user s active participation in the construction of the story finally transmedia narratives are addressed understood as strategies that expand the narrative universe through multiple media and platforms allowing an immersive and fragmented experience that involves the audience at different levels and contexts

counter narratives only make sense in relation to something else that which they are countering the very name identifies it as a positional category in tension with another category but what is dominant and what is resistant are not of course static questions but rather are forever shifting placements the discussion of counter narratives is ultimately a consideration of multiple layers of positioning the fluidity of these relational categories is what lies at the center of the chapters and commentaries collected in this book the book comprises six target chapters by leading scholars in the field twenty two commentators discuss these chapters from a number of diverse vantage points followed by responses from the six original authors a final chapter by the editor of the book series concludes the book

the narrative turn in the humanities which expanded the study of narrative to various disciplines has found a correlate in the medial turn in narratology long restricted to language based literary fiction narratology has found new life in the recognition that storytelling can take place in a variety of media and often combines signs belonging to different semiotic categories visual auditory linguistic and perhaps even tactile the essays gathered in this volume apply the newly gained awareness of the expressive power of media to particular texts demonstrating the productivity of a medium aware analysis through the examination of a wide variety of different media ranging from widely studied such as literature and film to new neglected or non standard ones such as graphic novels photography television musicals computer games and advertising they address some of the most fundamental questions raised by the medial turn in narratology how can narrative meaning be created in media other than language how do different types of signs collaborate with each other in so called multi modal works and what new forms of narrativity are made possible by the emergence of digital media

throughout this book the concept of framing is used to look at art photography scientific drawings

and cinema as visually constituted spatially bounded productions the way these genres relate to that which exists beyond the frame by means of plastic chemically transposed pencil sketched or moving images allows us to decipher the particular language of the visual and at the same time circumscribe the dialectic between presence and absence that is proper to all visual media yet these kinds of re framing owe their existence to the ruptures and upheavals that marked the demise of certain discursive systems in the past announcing the emergence of others that were in turn overturned
